



We are responsible for 36 Early Childhood Centres, 7 secondary schools, 40 primary schools, 3 standalone ASN schools, 5 Supported Learning Centres and 2 Communication Centres. We also have 3 training centres in Kilmarnock, Netherthird and one opening in Galston. We also have a team of Educational Psychologists, and Outdoor Learning Team, and Instrumental Music Service, Creative Minds Team and the East Ayrshire Support Service. Over 2500 people work in the service and we are the largest service in the council.

Children and Young People usually attend their local, catchment school and parents can register for this online. You can choose the denominational or non-denominational school for your child.

A parent/carer can choose to submit a Placing Request if they wish their child to attend a school outwith their catchment area and this will be considered by the Education Service.







OVERVIEW OF SCOTTISH EDUCATION

Scotland provides free education to all children living in Scotland (and have done so as early as the 17th century). Scotland's schools operate a Curriculum for Excellence which provides knowledge, skills and attributes for learning and life, from early years to primary and secondary schooling between the ages of 3 - 18. Some young people attend Early Years Centres under the age of 3 under special circumstances, and some young people stay in school until 19 in the Additional Support Needs sector.







Early Years Education

Children are able to go Early Years Centres in Scotland from the age of three, and all are entitled to 1140 hours of education. Many young people are also entitled to attend from age 2, and some from 0-2years.

Primary school:

Dependent on when in the year a child's birthday falls, children will attend primary school for seven years between the ages of five and 12.

Secondary school:

Dependent on when in the year a child's birthday falls, children will attend secondary school for up to six years between the ages of 12 and 18.







Curriculum for Excellence (CfE)

The Curriculum for Excellence (CfE) is the national curriculum used from early years onwards. It was implemented in 2010. All schools MUST deliver this.

It comprises a broad general education up to the end of S3 (third year in secondary) followed by a senior phase of learning from S4 to S6.

CfE is intended to foster four capacities in all young people:

- 1.successful learners
- 2.confident individuals
- 3.responsible citizens
- 4.effective contributors










Broad General Education: Age 3 to end of \$3



There are eight curriculum areas: <u>expressive arts</u>, <u>health and wellbeing</u>, <u>languages</u> (including English, Gàidhlig and Gaelic learners and modern languages), <u>mathematics</u>, <u>religious and moral studies</u>, <u>sciences</u>, <u>social studies</u> and <u>technologies</u>.

Support for families: Council

Young people who stay on at school after age of 16 from August 2024 may be able to get an Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA).EMA is a weekly payment of £30 for students who are planning to continue in post-compulsory education from August 2024.

Currently all children in P1 to P5 are entitled to universal free school meals, regardless of financial circumstances. Families on low income can apply for free school meals and milk and a grant to help towards the costs of buying school clothes for their children.

Free school transport

We will provide free transport for primary pupils who live one and a half miles or more from their local primary school(by the recognised shortest suitable walking distance) and secondary pupils who live three miles or more from their local secondary school (by the recognised shortest suitable walking distance)

Support for families Scottish Government

The <u>National Entitlement Card (NEC)</u> aims to make it easier for young people to access public services across Scotland, using one card to access many services.

The Young Person's National Entitlement Card is free to anyone residing in Scotland who is aged 11-25.

Young persons' (under 22s) free bus travel scheme

Young people aged 5-21 years living in Scotland can now apply to access free bus travel.

The Scottish Government has a Best Start Grant School Age Payment. The £250 School Age Payment is made around the time a child normally starts Primary 1 to help with the costs of a child starting school. You can use it for anything from school bags, shoes, a warm coat, after school clubs, books or days out Social Security Scotland are taking applications via:
